### Tumbalong Light Show at Darling Harbour

For families with a child with a disability, and for Group Homes etc, Cushman and Wakefield have a light show at Tumbalong Park from 25th May to 16th June. You can book parking, and experience this light show, which will run for 3 sessions at night during the Vivid Festival. Families with children that have a disability or special access requirements can pre-register for free family zone tickets which will be run across three session times each night, ensuring a seamless and enjoyable experience.

One pre booked low sensory session will be available each night, this will allow people with autism or sensory sensitivities to experience Tumbalong Lights with lowered light and sound and reduced crowds.

Two tactile tours (subject to interest) will be offered to those that are blind or vision impaired, so that they can engage and enjoy each interactive experience via touch and description.
