Covid -19 Protocol

We are very pleased to be getting back to sailing with all our groups and individuals invited. We have developed a protocol that has been approved by Sailability NSW which meets the requirements of the NSW governments

NSW Public Health Orders (No. 5) now allows those engaged in community sport (competition and training) to be within the 1.5 metre social distancing.

All of our sailing activities are either training or racing;

At sign-in, recording each individual's temperatures is required.

BBQ and Canteens are still limited to 2 0 people inside and outside.

All Hansa 303's or 2.3's are permitted to be sailed single or double handed.

By signing the COVID Compliance sheet, Individuals who intend to sail 2-up are agreeing that they are willing to sail with another.

When sailing 2-up, each individual sailor must wear a mask. Volunteers and sailors must change masks and sanitise themselves and equipment at crew changes.

An email has been sent to all groups and individuals. Please take note special note that all participants must wear a mask.

It was good to see Sasha with us again, after many months of clashing shifts, as well as Jim, Warwick, Ragnhild, Denis,



Switching on the Sea-Bin, 14 October 2020

> later, then Ralph Newman, Eli D, Vin and Woody in fairly quick succession.


The second race started at 11.10, and the results were totally different: This time Black Swan came in first, Eli D close behind,

First Aid Courses for Northern Met. Region, 2020

Timeline: 2020

February, Applications published.

March, Application for 20 First Aid Courses completed and submitted. Covid-19 lockdown in NSW.

June: Application accepted, and funding received. Grant notified to Manly, Pittwater, Middle Harbour, Rushcutters Bay Branches of Sailability NSW open to application.

July: Successful participants advised, First Aid Plus notified, training papers received and distributed. Students worked on papers and completed the written section of the course by 2nd August.



August: First attempt to meet at MYC to complete course was postponed due to Covid-19 Restrictions. Papers were handed in for marking, and 4 scenarios distributed to be filled in by students.

Attempts made to arrange Practical Section of First Aid Plus course later in 2020.

October: Finally, Practical section of First Aid Plus course planned in 2 sessions: 11th and 25th October, limit 10 people for each course. These courses were successfully carried out with all students who attended successful. Unfortunately, due to the lengthy drawn our nature of the course 2 students were unable to finish for various reasons, so that we ended up with 18 successful course attendees.

The end result is: Manly 11 newly trained First Aiders

- Pittwater: 5 newly trained First Aiders.
- Crystal Bay: 2 newly trained First Aiders.

Congratulations to all of these determined students and a HUGE THANK YOU to our teachers: Maz and Gary Troop from First Aid Plus, who worked very conscientiously through all of the course work in spite of the broken up and unusual nature of this course, which we will all remember as completed in the Year of Covid.
